

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Power the League to Power the Vote! That's the League's theme for this election season, spanning from the June 5 Primary to the November 6 Presidential Election. I hope to see you all at our Voters Service Meeting April 9 from 3 to 5 p.m. at the League office in Lafayette. It's the best way to get involved!

Voters Service is the League's most popular activity; the public has learned to look to us for non-partisan, accurate, unbiased information about candidates (we never support or oppose any candidate) and about ballot measures, voter registration, reasoned pros and cons on issues, poll locations, and election processes. Our public outreach with tangible resources allows us to engage people in our League work and to involve them in having meaningful impact in their communities.

We tip our hats to our outstanding Voters Service leadership and participating members. The Voter Service Director is coordinating our Candidate Forums moderated by Lisa Vorderbrueggen on May 3rd in the Board of Supervisors Chambers in Martinez, focusing on the contested race to succeed Contra Costa Supervisor Gayle Uilkema in District II (Lamorinda, San Ramon Valley) and the new state Assembly District 11 (Antioch, Oakley, Brentwood, Discovery Bay, Fairfield, Vacaville, Rio Vista). We have a SmartVoter administrator who controls our participation in SmartVoter.org, the invaluable resource for fact-based information about candidates and issues that many voters (including me!) consult prior to elections so we will not vote based on ignorance.

The Pros and Cons Chair continues her outstanding. This year we will include redistricting information and key facts about our new open top-two primary system for the June 5 election, as well as two ballot measures (see page 3, *Vote with the League*). Another Chair coordinates about 20 League members as we help keep voter registration boxes full in post offices and libraries across our Orinda to Discovery Bay territory. I look forward to seeing our team at work at the Voters Service Meeting April 9; you come too! We will also update everyone on the latest on the voter registration application, so all will be ready to participate in Last Chance Voter Registration on Monday evening, May 21.

Voter Service is a great time for outreach. Do you know of organizations that might like a pros and cons presentation? Call the office and let us know. It's a good time to reach out to diverse organizations, including youth, college students, and minorities, and to extend our presence in the community. I'm very pleased we are now having Community Service volunteers from local high schools participate in our work, as we reach out to register eligible seniors.

We hope all League members will not only participate in our Voter Service activities, but also invite a friend to join in and possibly to join the League. Most new members come from personal invitations from League members. I remember being asked to join by a League member in the Moraga Commons dog park! Who in your friendship circle would make a good League member? We hope you will ask them.

LWVC RECOMMENDS... VOTE WITH THE LEAGUE

We <u>support</u> Proposition 28, <u>the Legislative Term Limits Reform Act</u>. This simple reform will help make our legislature more accountable and effective. The current limits on how many terms an individual can serve in the legislature would be replaced by a twelve-year limit on the total number of years one could serve—whether in the Assembly, the Senate, or a combination of the two.

We have taken a <u>neutral</u> position on Proposition 29, <u>the California Cancer Research Act</u>. This measure would add a one-dollar per pack tax on cigarettes sold in California, with proceeds to be used for cancer and other smoking-related health issues, antismoking campaigns, and law enforcement.

MORE INFORMATION ON ONE BAY AREA PLANNING

MTC/ABAG will issue in April a more complete set of policies and strategies that can aid local jurisdictions in bringing sustainable communities into being. Meanwhile, we have a report on the regional planning process for the region's next forty years. Released March 9, it confirms that most future growth in the Bay Area will be in Santa Clara County, followed by Alameda County and the East Bay, notably in the Dublin and Concord growth centers. Due to meetings with the public and local governments last year, selected growth centers are being offered help as Priority Development Areas. PDAs are transit-oriented infill clusters with appropriate higher density housing adjacent to work, school, and commercial facilities. The need for this approach arises from the state mandate to reduce greenhouse-gas emissions from our car, truck, and bus traffic.

This new informative draft report, "Jobs-Housing Connection Scenario," is available as a PDF file at <www.onebayarea.org/>. It defines future growth, once recovered, to be strong and sustainable. Activities by local planners will be recognizable but more technical and specialized to meet 21st century demands. New growth will be integrative, with local governments working together with regional agencies to supply amenities and infrastructure. The PDAs will use greater connectivity with transportation and housing with other community needs. These developments may be eligible for grant assistance. Input from the public at large, from workshops, telephone polls, and website surveys, after analysis is available for review at <www.onebayarea.org/workshops/winter_2012_results.htm>.

MTC/ABAG suggest an assortment of housing types and transportation choices to suit growth and investments tailored to each city or town. Is the next generation in your town going to share the same age profile as the current one? Will it want to find plug-in recharging stations at convenient places? Issues like these will be considered. Regional planners have been in dialog with county congestion management agencies and local staffs over data collected and resulting scenarios created for different situations.

Two general trends have been seen in recent years, according the Bay Area Council and others. The first is slow but steady employment growth shifting from outward expansion to infill on underutilized land in existing urbanized areas, serving an aging population with pending baby-boomer retirements. The rate of this growth is forecast only slightly greater than national employment growth rates.

The second trend is the shift from dispersed employment and housing growth toward more focused growth. This is illustrated in the job growth in the city/county of San Francisco. In 1975, it held 33 percent of jobs, but by 2010, it held only 16 percent. Dispersed outward growth cost us in loss of agricultural lands and forming high levels of traffic congestion and longer commuting times.

Steve Levy of the Center for Continuing Study of the California Economy warns that our ability to produce housing affordable to incoming job-holders will be constricted, which creates pressure for longer commutes. His analysis is contained in the report mentioned earlier. Employer parking spaces will max out unless commuters take advantage of shuttle services run by employers in private business parks, and car or vanpools riding on high occupancy toll roads.

A year ago, many local communities objected to their allocated high projected growth numbers. Others thought the numbers acceptable if development monies were available for infrastructure. Numbers have now been adjusted, and PDAs address the location of most new growth in areas best suited to receive it. Two hundred PDAs of varying size and designations will be developed all through the region. They will be modest in rural towns, whereas medium-sized centers may contain mid-rise and high-rise buildings. Some small suburban communities show a mix of townhouses and 2-to-3 story commercial structures. Fewer centers will concentrate on higher development. Many new PDAs seek to move away from a "project-by-project' design toward the creation of suitably scaled complete communities that meet the daily needs of residents and workers, day or night.

Contra Costa County's new Priority Development Area place types are shown on the newly amended map (approximate locations):

- One Regional Center Concord North BART/Community Reuse Area
- Three City Centers Concord In Town, Walnut Creek Transit Center, Richmond Intermodal Center
- Three Suburban Centers Antioch, Oakley, San Ramon (future) City Center
- Eight Transit Town Centers Antioch, Oakley, Pittsburg, North San Ramon, Lafayette, Moraga, Orinda, Hercules Intermodal, Hercules, Richmond, El Cerrito
- Six Mixed Use Corridors Pleasant Hill/DVC/El Cerrito, San Pablo, Pinole, Hercules, Richmond

League members, make a copy of the report mentioned above. It contains numerical tables and maps, all of which help us communicate with our local governments. Nothing is cast in concrete. We have an opportunity to open dialogs over future growth issues, and for us to understand some of the business of local councils when we show up as Observers.


